

Focus Group Discussion 4: Stewardship of Human Remains

April 24, 2023

Part 1. Opening and Introductions.

Land Acknowledgement: The University of Michigan is located on the traditional territory of the Anishinaabe people. In 1817, the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Bodewademi Nations made the largest single land transfer to the University of Michigan. This was offered ceremonially as a gift through the Treaty at the Foot of the Rapids so that their children could be educated. Through these words of acknowledgment, their contemporary and ancestral ties to the land and their contributions to the University are renewed and reaffirmed.

At least for a few minutes, prioritize quantity over quality for your responses. Wild ideas are encouraged. Responses should be limited to **1-2 sentences**. 1. **What, to you, are human remains?**
2. **What is the best possible outcome for these human remains? What would this look like for you in 10 years if constraints (money, time, laws) were removed?**
