Biography

Harley Harris Bartlett, born 1886, was a botanist and linguist based at the University of Michigan. While conducting research for the United States Rubber Company in Sumatra, Bartlett made collecting trips to the Philippines and other Southeast Asian countries. Between 1934 and 1935, he was an exchange professor at the University of the Philippines. In 1948, he became the educational consultant for the Philippines in the United States, and a chairman of the Commission on the Philippines. He would return there to introduce high-yielding rubber plants. He died in 1960, in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Collection Scope and Content Note

The collection includes ethnographic material collected by Bartlett on various visits to the Philippines, 1935 to 1959. A portion of the collection was donated to the University of

Michigan, the remaining objects were donated to the Logan Museum of Anthropology at Beloit College. The Logan Bartlett collection of Philippine material is currently findable in the Logan Museum's digital collections. The collection at the University of Michigan is primarily composed of hats, tools for their manufacture, and botanical samples.

The collection has not been attributed to any Philippine ethnolinguistic groups. The collection has also not been reviewed by an individual with expertise in Philippine ethnolinguistic cultures. The catalog information reflects what has been previously provided by the donor and the Museum's historic naming conventions. At this time, it cannot be stated with specificity when, where, or by whom the objects were created.

The collection contains human remains and associated burial items.
