Biography

Williams was born in 1893. He graduated from Kemper Military School in 1914, and was a commissioned officer in the Philippines from 1914-1917. In Manila he would complete his Constabulary training, and in approximately December of 1914 he would begin service at the 5th Mountain Company in Mayaoyao, Ifugao. He would later be sent to Banaue. Following his service in the Philippines he worked as a businessman in China, and in WWII he served as a Major in the U.S. military. Williams died in 1981.

Collection Scope and Content Note

Donor information indicates that these spears were taken from indigenous peoples of North Luzon. In the 1910s, the donor wrote that these individuals were Ifugao, Igorotes, or Gaddangs, though these labels are not consistent with how ethnolinguistic groups define themselves today. The donor also claims that these spears were used in the practice of headhunting, though the accuracy of this statement has not been verified by an expert.

The collection has not been attributed to any Philippine ethnolinguistic groups. The collection has also not been reviewed by an individual with expertise in Philippine ethnolinguistic cultures. The catalog information reflects what has been previously provided by the donor and the Museum's historic naming conventions. At this time, it cannot be stated with specificity when, where, or by whom the objects were created.
